


2023 UAS Missions



Prevention

The Prevention Division is responsible for protecting lives and property through fire code adoption, fire inspections, code enforcement, fire investigations, permitting and community outreach and education.



Hazard Mitigation Plan

The Prevention team at Lake Travis Fire Rescue actively engaged in collaborative efforts by participating in the Travis County Hazard Mitigation Action Plan Planning Team.



This involvement underscores our commitment to proactive measures for community safety and hazard mitigation.

New Code Adoption



In 2023, Travis County ESD No. 6's Board of Commissioners, with the recommendation of LTFR's Fire Marshal, adopted the 2021 International Fire Code.

Police Academy Graduate

Wildfire Mitigation

The Wildfire Mitigation Department at Lake Travis Fire Rescue takes proactive measures to reduce the risk and impact of wildfires in the region. Through strategic vegetation management, community outreach, and comprehensive planning, they work to create defensible spaces, raise awareness about wildfire risks, and enhance overall preparedness.



Winter Storm Mara

Lake Travis Fire Rescue played a crucial role in supporting the City of Bee Cave during the burning of more than 100,000 cubic yards of brush from Winter Storm Mara. Collaborating with Tri-City Emergency Management, LTFR facilitated the coordination and obtained approval from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for the controlled burning of a substantial amount of debris.

Dustin Dunn, Wildfire Mitigation Specialist, participated in a panel discussion hosted by the Private Risk Management Association regarding wildland fires in Texas. Other panelists included representatives from the insurance industry.






