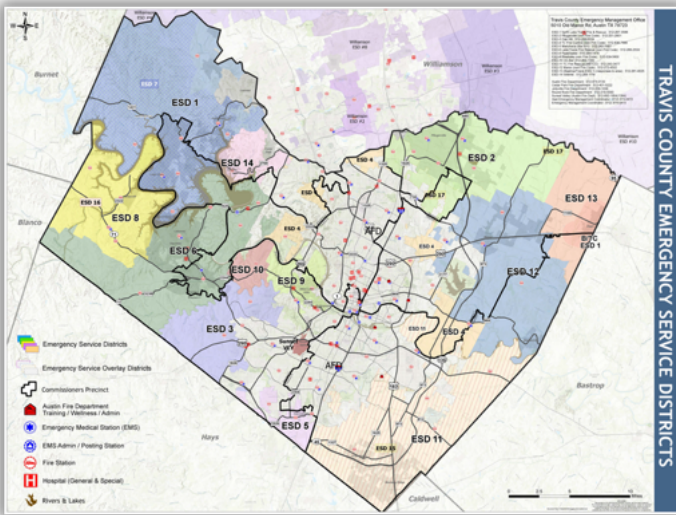

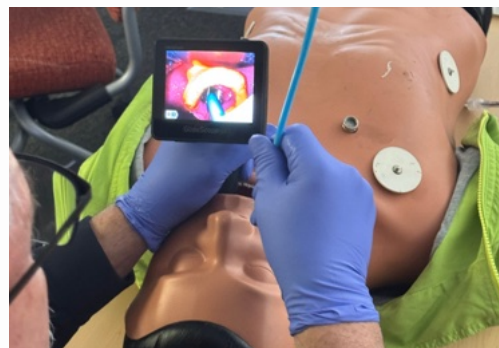

Fire codes are crucial for several reasons as they play a fundamental role in ensuring public safety and minimizing the risk of fire-related incidents. Six Travis County ESDs maintain and service fire codes and enforcement within their jurisdiction.

ISO RATINGS

An ISO rating, short for Insurance Services Office rating, is a measure used by insurance companies to assess a community's firefighting capabilities. The rating evaluates factors like equipment, training, and water supply to determine how well a fire department can respond to emergencies. A lower ISO rating often results in lower insurance premiums for residents, as it indicates a higher level of fire protection in the community.
